And a Little Child Shall Lead Them

"Don't let anyone think less of you because you are young. Be an example to all believers..." 1 Timothy 4:12

Something extraordinary happened this past weekend – and regardless of your political views or the side of the issue you come down upon – you must take notice. Last Saturday over 800,000 people descended on the capitol in Washington, DC to take a stand. In addition, people gathered in 800 cities around the world to stand with them...including 20,000 in our very own St. Paul. The extraordinary part though wasn't even the masses that

showed up, it was WHO organized it, led it, and left us all in awe. In the span of a little over 5 weeks, in the wake of horror and tragedy that most of us cannot even imagine, a group of teenagers pulled off the most attended march in the history of our capitol.

Yes, the youth did it. A generation that is seen as being on their phones all the time, not noticing what is happening in the world around them, and who many dismiss as the "future" and not necessarily relevant today...they pulled off a gathering like none have ever seen before.

What I found incredibly impressive about the program they put together in Washington was the diversity of youth invited to the stage. There were youth from Parkland and Chicago and Los Angeles – kids from privilege who have just experienced gun violence for the first time and kids from communities who have been living that reality their entire lives – white kids, black kids, brown kids – all on stage together. A singular voice around a specific issue that will make a difference. Yes, the youth did it.

There is a reason I spent the first 15 years of my call as a pastor working with youth...some of whom I watched march in St. Paul and in Washington on Saturday. These young people are not "the future", they are a real glimpse of the Kingdom of God, right here and right now.

I have been ruminating since Saturday about the feelings I often have, that many of you share with me, of being overwhelmed, feeling helpless, not knowing what to do even if I did want to take a stand or accomplish something that seems so big. What Saturday reminded us of is that sometimes things just need to be done. The students of Parkland experienced the unimaginable and decided they had something to say about it...and so they did. Yes, the youth did it.

What is stopping us from doing the things that need to be done for the gospel, for our community, for our congregation? Most of the time it probably boils down to fear. (Ask some of your fellow members who went out into the neighborhood to put up Salem flyers how excited they were at the idea of flyering. Then ask then how it went.)

What kingdom work do we need to stand up and do right now? Whom should we be walking alongside? How can we be better neighbors? What changes do we need to make to stay relevant?


In just 5 weeks group of kids put together a march that included more than a million people around the country and the world...what do you suppose we could do?

Strangers in Their Own Land by Arlie Russell Hochschild

Why have the southern states become such "Red" states, supporting the Tea Party, and listening to Rush Limbaugh and Fox News? Why has Louisiana sustained severe ecological damages from chemical and petroleum fracking, and mining operations, devastating whole counties and making them almost uninhabitable? Why, when Louisiana had become the nation's second poorest state, did Governor Jindal cut corporate taxes and spent \$1.6 billion to lure industry to the state? Why did the citizens put up with massive cuts in higher education, and social services? Why is there such resistance to receiving federal funds for education, health services, law enforcement or ecological rehabilitation?

Hochschild, a sociologist from Berkeley, CA, wanted to get to know the people of the South, what they really believe, and, perhaps, why they vote the way they do. She developed a respectful listening relationship with individuals and families in Louisiana, becoming attuned to how their feelings affected their beliefs, actions and votes.

She concentrated on middle-class people and discovered a culture of "victimization." They expressed, "When do we get to take our place on line for the American Dream?" From the Civil War and through the 1960's black rights movement, white men of the South felt they had been continuously shoved back in line. Meanwhile white wages leveled or sank, while some elite were becoming very wealthy at their expense, and women, blacks, homosexuals, and immigrants were demanding their place at the table. Endless "line-cutters" were getting tax-supported hand-outs. Many white male citizens were feeling like "Strangers in their own land".

Robert B. Reich, professor of public policy, UC Berkeley says: "With compassion and empathy, Hochschild discovers the narrative that gives meaning and expression to these peoples' lives and which explains their political convictions along with much else. Anyone who wants to understand modern America should read this captivating book".

The book includes 27 reading group guide questions.


