Leaning Into Abundance During a Global Pandemic

I don't know if you have noticed, but things have changed–and quickly. So quickly, that at times it has been hard to keep up. Just three weeks ago we were talking about a time, in the future, that we might not be able to come together to worship. Little did we know that we would not be able to safely worship in-person that very weekend. The world has been sent into chaos by Covid-19. And in the midst of all this chaos, we are still called to be the church.

I will admit that for about 2 1/2 days I was panicked. What would we do without worship? Without any meetings? How on earth could we continue to be church? Nobody taught us how to do this.

It would be our friendly first service musician extraordinaire, Kent, who would say something that would change my thinking. When I asked how he and his family were doing, he made a comment about "leaning into abundance". While probably unknown to Kent, that was the precisely the 2x4 I needed to get me out of my head.

Leaning into our abundance? What do you mean? There is a global pandemic happening and life is changing by the hour, leaving us distant and afraid. Yes...AND...

- Salem is a tight-knit community that is connected in so many more ways than Sunday worship.
- Salem is small enough that most everyone knows each other and making contact is not difficult or strange.
- Salem has FANTASTIC leadership that is willing to adapt and get creative when called to.
- Salem has been through the wilderness before, this community is no stranger to difficulties and change, and has always come out the other side better, stronger, and more connected.
- Salem has a balanced budget, no debt, and INCREDIBLY generous members and friends.
- We live in an age of, and have access to, technology that allows us to "gather" even when we can't be together.

I could continue to add to the list, but think I might leave that up to you.

The reality is that one of the great challenges in our world, even in the best of times, is to lean into our abundance-to be

grateful. Turns out this has never been more true than during a pandemic. While ALL of us can lament the things we do not have today that we did 4 weeks ago, with a realization that some have been more severely affected than others, there is still a chance for all of us to look at what we can be grateful for and to lean into the abundance we find.

While we are staying home during this time of social distancing, I want to challenge us all to lean into our abundance, both as individuals and as a church. Inside these pages you will find a gratitude challenge to help you find the abundance that may seem far away during these days.

Then, I implore you to continue to be the church. I didn't realize how much I would grieve not seeing you all on a weekly basis. Then I discovered that when we "gather" via technology, we really do gather. The work we do as the church is not about where we meet. Even when we can't come to the building, in the midst of a stay at home order during a global pandemic, we are still the church.

And I don't know if you have noticed, but the church, God's people, have been at work in the world in these days! Kids getting fed, people stepping up to help small businesses, medical students stepping in to care for children of doctors and nurses, people sewing masks, and neighbors reaching out and helping neighbors just because they can. All of it—out of abundance.

We are the church, and as bad as the world seems to get at times, we are still called to be the church. I invite you, in these unprecedented times, to lean into abundance, be the church, wash your hands, and be well!

Be Not Afraid

Mark 4:35-41

Be not afraid. As a person of faith during the current global pandemic, you may have heard this imperative often recently. Perhaps you might have heard Jesus' questions for the disciples, "Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?", after he calms the sea of Galilea during a storm (Mark 4:40). These words at this specific time may make us feel disappointed in ourselves. We may be told not to be afraid, to place our faith in God always, but then we see news about self-isolation, panic buying, scarcity of tests, scarcity of ventilators, and our fear grows again. And we may become disappointed in ourselves because though we understand the simple commandment to not be afraid, in our lives right now it is so, so hard.

At this moment, I try not to think of faith as a set of rules that, once given, we will follow for the rest of our lives. Instead, I think of faith as a practice which we take on every day to try to better love our God and our neighbors than we did the day before. The story of the Gospel is not one where the disciples accept the call to follow Jesus and then live in perfect holiness for the rest of their lives. The disciples' story is a journey where they often doubt and struggle to understand that greater meaning of Jesus' teaching in their broken world. Our faith is a similar journey, and like the disciples, we find the calm in the midst of the storm of our world through living daily in the power of Jesus's love.

So I invite you, during these times when we are often overcome with fear, to find comfort in practice. Often, we hold our anxious thoughts inside ourselves, polishing them like worry stones by revisiting them over and over again. Practice saying your worries aloud, just like we say our prayers aloud in worship. Follow your worries by saying, *Be not afraid*, not as a commandment but a reminder. Call your loved ones and say your worries to them and listen to their worries. Practice releasing yourself from the shame of fear and practice finding calm in Jesus's power in the midst of the storm. Remember that this is an episode in our faith journey, not the full story, and though we may be afraid, we are still beloved by God.

ZOOM Basics

Are you new to ZOOM? Here are some Zoom basics!



Zoom is mostly used for video conference calls

among co-workers, but is being used by many for worship now around the globe. Unlike streaming video, Zoom offers the possibility of collaboration and interaction as we worship together. ZOOM meetings can be accessed by computer, smartphone, tablet but can also be accessed, without video, by any phone.

Joining A Zoom Gathering:

- The link, meeting ID and call in number for each gathering are unique. Be sure you use the one we provide for each separate gathering.
- If you are joining by computer, tablet, or smartphone, click on the unique link provided. If you've never used Zoom before, you may need to download it and give it permission to use your camera. If you don't have a camera on your computer, that's OK. We won't be able to see you, but you should be able to see us!
- If you are joining via regular phone, use the phone number and meeting ID provided. You will miss seeing the gathered group and any presentation we might be showing, but we would love to hear you voice and you will be able to hear us.

Zoom Tips & Etiquette:

- You will have a menu of icons towards the top or bottom of your screen include Mute, Stop Video, and Chat (sometimes listed under "More").
- In large groups, the host may automatically "mute" you to avoid cacophony. In other meetings, you can "mute" and "unmute" yourself to avoid lots of background noise using the icon is shaped like a microphone; it will have a line across it when you are muted.

- If you will be speaking to the group, it may be helpful to wear headphones (any old pair that will plug into or link to your device).
- Stop Video: If for any reason you don't want folks seeing into your home, you can click on "stop video" icon shaped like a video camera. You will still be on the call.
- Chat: Since it is impractical to talk all at once on Zoom, the chat function offers another opportunity to ask questions, give feedback, or submit prayer requests. The Chat icon is shaped like a cartoon speech bubble. When you click on it, a chat screen will open up on the right side of your video. The space to type is towards the bottom and all you need to do is type what you want to say to the group and it will appear for everyone to read.

Thanks for your patience - we know many of you are learning something new and those leading worship are learning what will work as well! Feel free to send feedback via email afterwards about what did or didn't work for you.
