Things I've Learned from a Global Pandemic

I will tell you up front, this Scene has been a hard one to put together because there is just so much we don't know…about a virus in our midst, about where we can and will be able to go or gather, about what the future holds in general, and about how we as a community will look tomorrow, next week, next month, and even next year. There is so much we don't know. That is the *first* thing I have learned from a global pandemic…there is just so much we don't know.

The *second* thing I have learned is that when a crisis hits we are very good at counting our blessings and have a harder time talking about the things we grieve and are angry about. Which, I admit, in general is great! I do want us to be cautious about not giving our laments a space to breathe. Both are necessary, Biblical, and part of who we are as Christians and as humans.

Third on my list, but probably the first thing I actually learned, is that I am not as tech savvy as I might have liked to think I was. The good news is that the *fourth* thing on my list is that this dog can be taught new tricks! Yay!

Fifth, I have learned...again...that my congregation is very patient, understanding, and kind. I have been afforded grace upon grace in the process of learning new tricks and leading from a completely new place.

I have learned that I touch my face way more than I should! (That's number *six*.) Lucky for me a mask helps me do it less...and that's number *seven*.

Eight? We don't know how busy we are and how much we don't see our families until we are with them all the time. I have had moments with the 12 and 15 year old boys that call me mom, that would never have happened without a "stay at home" order.

Talso did not realize how much I would miss seeing each of you on a weekly basis...until I couldn't see each of you on a weekly basis. I miss you—that's number *nine*.

I am struck by the universality of this experience. (That's number *ten.*) I am not alone...none of us are alone. We are all punting because none of us know what we are doing. We are all tired, grieving, angry, hyper-aware, sad, flustered...but most of all we are all...each and every one of us...just scared. That's number *eleven*—fear is powerful and exhausting and makes everything hard. But I go back to number 10 to find solace in the fact that I may be scared—but I am not alone.

Which is what brings me to number *twelve*. While I know that I am not alone and while I find comfort in the fact that the whole globe is going through this, it is a much greater accompaniment that truly gives me hope. You see, in the midst of this whole

thing, even when we aren't looking because we are too scared to open our eyes... right smack dab in the middle of all of it...is the Holy Spirit sent to accompany us. In the good times, in the bad times, and even the seemingly impossible times, the Holy Spirit is alive and well and living in and around and through each and every one of us.

This is the promise we are given as the body of Christ. This is the promise we ding to as beloved of God. This is OUR promise...and I have never known a time in my own life and in the lives of those I love that we have needed it more. And as I slowly open my eyes, I am touched by the wings of the Holy Spirit in the faces I see in a Zoom worship room, in the smile from a stranger behind a mask, in the voice of someone on the phone, in my children's trusting eyes and strong hugs, in the work my husband does to make a lost child feel included, in the love of my dogs who sit at my feet, in the sound of youth group on ZOOM, in the faces of Ingrid, Axel, Xavier, or Solveig, in kids' Zoom, in colleagues as we work together to do new and creative things, in music our musicians so beautifully offer up, in people going out of the way to love their neighbors all over the world, artists (for me, especially the Indigo Girls) sharing their gifts freely online just to make people "feel better", in healthcare workers on the font lines, in scientists working so very hard, in leaders who have an impossible job and yet continue to lead, in patients who recover and walk out of hospitals, in new babies being born and in not so new babies graduating...and in a myriad of other big and little things that seem to shine into my days in mysterious and random ways as if the Holy Spirit is saying..."Hey Rhonda, look at me! I'm hereyou are not alone! Trust, hope, believe, and most importantly...remember to breathe and to love...for I am with you."

Yes, there are lots of things we have learned in a global pandemic, but I believe the greatest of these is maybe less learning and more just a reminder—that we are not alone, that God is with us and in that presence, no matter the situation, there is hope. Wash Your Hands and Be Well!

<u>Council Treasurer's Report from May 13, 2020 (for full minutes/financials, see the e-blast or contact the office)</u>


Both income and expenses have been somewhat lower than budget and, overall, year-to-date net income is on track with budget. The endowment fund is down about \$2000 from the beginning of 2019 as a result of the downturn in the stock market. SpringHouse is experiencing a substantial decrease in rental income. Funds from prior year surpluses will likely be used to cover the expected shortfall.

"Instant Expert: World Religions" - 4 Sundays at 4 pm beginning on Sunday June 14



Reaching Out to Each Other and Beyond...

One Great Community of Christ

I find it ironic that, during these times when we are physically distant from each other, we depend upon our communities more than ever. While we like to believe in the ultimate power of our individual actions, much of what we've heard in the past few months has shown us that the spread of COVID-19 can only be slowed by working together. Those of us who can stay home choose to, in order to protect the essential workers who must go out. In grocery stores and pharmacies, we wear face masks and stand six feet apart, in order to reduce our chances of infecting someone else. If a community is a group of people collectively acting for the common good, then this pandemic has entered us into a community with our entire state, country, and world.

But living in a community can be challenging, especially in times of crisis. We become frustrated with the other customers while we're in crowded grocery store, with our loud neighbors while we try to work from home, with our own family members while we're cooped up together day in and day out. In this way, the Narrative Lectionary's selections from 1 Corinthians for the month of May have uncanny relevance for our lives today. In his letter, Paul speaks to a community in crisis, facing persecution from outside forces while also experiencing internal division due to different loyalties and backgrounds. He provides them with a framework on how to hold together in times of struggle and how to uplift each other up in their shared love for Christ.

As we continue on through 1 Corinthians, ask yourself how Paul's writings about community apply to your own life in the time of COVID-19. Personally, I'm struck by his instruction that whatever we do, we must do with love (1 Corinthians 13). I think about how wearing a face mask and staying home can be an act of love for the most vulnerable of our community. I think about how the verses "love is patient...it bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things" encourages us to practice grace for our family members, friends, and neighbors, especially when we may differ or disagree (1 Corinthians 13: 4, 7). Paul's words remind us that God's gift of love unites us with all of humanity, and we are called to care for each other as one great community in Christ.




