Hope Wins!



Last Sunday I didn't have a sermon to finish (or start), so on Sunday morning I was up at 4 am with "nothing" to do. So I turned on CNN and watched from inside the Pfizer warehouse in Michigan as hundreds of masked workers packaged thousands of tiny vials in dry ice and put them on a truck. I kept wondering if it was really that slow of a news day...but the more I thought about it, the more I realized that what I was witnessing was hope. They finished packing that first truck and everyone stopped for a moment to turn and watch as the engine started up. Applause broke out as the truck pulled away from the dock and hope won.

Then I came to church to get ready to lead worship, and I will fully admit, if it could go wrong, it did. We barely held it together...but as I watched it all seemingly fall apart I remembered that pageant Sunday is always like that...a whole lot of chaos that never seems like it will work. Then I sat down to watch our kids and youth and families pull off something that had never even been dreamt up before...a virtual Christmas pageant. There were sheep and shepherds, angels and wise women, special effects, and even a brand-new baby to be baby Jesus! In a year when we thought a Christmas pageant was the far from possible...hope won.

Christmas is one week from today, and there are a lot of feelings to go around about the fact that we cannot do the things we want to do, or that we traditionally do every year at this time. The gatherings are cancelled – or at least look a whole lot different. Those who live alone have been alone way too long and isolation takes a toll. There is danger in the festivities we so long to be part of and the feelings of loss are real. Add to this that there is nobody to be angry at, or to blame...at least not really...because it's a virus and it doesn't care that we are angry or hurt.

On top of all these feelings about Christmas and celebrations, there is the real fact that people are hurting because businesses are closed, rent and mortgages are hard to pay if you are unemployed, and gifts for around the tree may be harder to come by than ever for some. And we cannot forget that tens of millions of our friends and neighbors have been sick and almost 310,000 people have

died...just in our country. So, if you have days when it feels overwhelming, you're not alone. These days are difficult, even for the most blessed.

And into this world...Christ is born anew...and hope wins.

But what I am realizing this week, as I watch warehouse workers ship out vaccines and watch a virtual Christmas pageant, is that Jesus doesn't do it alone. Hope doesn't just win because Christ breaks into the world. Hope wins because we follow and we live out Jesus' love and mercy and grace. *Christmas is not just about the inbreaking of Christ in the human world, it is about the human world changing because of Christ's inbreaking.*

Hope wins because Christ is born anew...and because we live out Christ's gospel. From vaccines and pageants to the daily care we give our neighbors, hope wins when we take part in Jesus' work. We are part of the hope, all of us, especially in a time such as this.

So please, this week and beyond, will you reach out to each other? Where, and to whom, can you offer hope? And if you are in need of hope, will you reach out to me...to your church family? Jesus shows up and the world is changed...hope is born in the darkest of places. How will you be hope for the world today?


