

Sometimes it's the little things. No. It's not sometimes, I am coming to believe that it's the little things all the time. I mean, no big things happen without a series of little things lining up right?

If you've attended worship in person over the last couple of months, you will know that one of the issues we have run into is disposal of the communion cups we are using. Before COVID, we never used them, but in a "post-Covid" church, we do. The problem is that every week we find a waste basket to put them in and when time comes for communion the following week, we are inevitably looking around for the missing waste basket. So someone goes into the hall or room next door and brings one in and we start the whole cycle over again. I mean, in the whole scheme of things, it is probably chuckle worthy, but practically speaking, it's a disruption that has not yet made it into the "before worship to do list" because the list is already full.

Well, last week I was reminded it's the little things. Kari, one of our faithful members, came into the sanctuary before worship and placed a nice white waste basket (with a liner) by the communion table. After worship she came up to me and told me that it was her mother's waste basket...one that she barely used...and that she would love it to be here in her memory. Then we both had a good chuckle and I said, "It's the little things, isn't it?" Then, somewhat jesting, I told her I would put a memorial plate (which we don't normally do) on it so nobody takes it during the week...and we laughed some more. But as she was leaving, I stopped her and said,

other at the meal. It's the little things.

Many of you knew Helen, who passed away in July. I knew her, but I had never met her in person...she

preferred e-mail communication. Helen and Gordon had stopped coming to church before I was called to Salem because of issues



with hearing. While they stayed members, they just couldn't join us in worship. Then Covid hit and we all had to pivot and Scott, our head tech guru, finally got me live-streaming (it had been his goal for a while). It was revolutionary for everyone in that time of isolation. But for Helen and her husband, who hadn't been to worship in years because of the sound in our space, it was life altering. "You see", she wrote, "we couldn't participate in person or on Zoom because of our hearing. But on YouTube we can. Taking communion with you and the musicians on Sunday morning feels like coming home." It's the little things. Hitting a live stream button on a camera or phone isn't a big deal. I mean, you can make it a big deal

by adding more complex equipment etc.—but at its base, it's not a big thing...it's a little thing.

The reality is that we don't ever know when the little things will add up and big things will

happen. We recently got a card in the mail from Helen's family with a note (one of many little notes, I'm sure) and a generous memorial gift that will help us continue to do the work of community that we are doing.

Saying hello, listening, inviting, being present, getting out into the neighborhood...all little things...but little things that add up and you never know when they will turn into big things.

Worship at Salem


What a great summer of worship! Worship in the park every month was a highlight of the summer–thank you for making it so wonderful!



FP&NP Practices, Listening, Neighboring Together

Our FP&NP team will be attending their big fall retreat this weekend and are excited about the direction they are headed. As they are working on the entire congregation's behalf this weekend, they leave you a couple things to chew on.

FP&NP Culture Moment

As we step outside the walls of our congregations and engage with neighbors from a variety of backgrounds, it's essential that we take the time to understand our own culture and the ways that culture influences our interactions. We are hoping to build in our neighborhoods and communities a sense of mutual trust – but trust-building looks different across cultures.

Many Western cultures assume a certain level of external trust and build trust through the execution of tasks – you say you will do something, then you do it, and I begin to trust you. But many non-Western cultures have a lower level of external trust and build trust relationally. This means that trust is built through time spent together and genuine connection.

When we take that step into the neighborhood can we be conscious of our own culture of trust-building and strive to meet others where they are? Take some time today to reflect on how you show others that you are trustworthy and how others have shown that to you. Have you assumed that this is how trust is built everywhere? What would you focus on if you are connecting with someone from a non-Western culture?




Spiritual Practices and Neighboring: How They Fit Together

Ingrid, Josh, & Axel finished our 11th blanket for Camp Noah.




Camp Noah is a camp for kids in communities that have been impacted by CAMP NOAH disaster. During Camp Noah, a team of certified camp staff accompany campers



adventure out of Sunday School. There will be lots of options each week and children will be able to choose which ones they do. Some of the activities that will be offered on any given week include:



SpringHouse Board Update

The SpringHouse Board met on Sunday, August 21, following the joint SH outdoor worship at Minnehaha Park. Highlights from the meeting are as follows:

- Treasurer Andy Rennert submitted the profit-loss figures for January through July. Expenses are not as high as expected; only 80% of the year-to-date budget has been spent.
- The Building Coordinator and the Youth Minister positions have been posted, but no interviews have been held yet.
- Mike Cackoski presented three Building Committee documents that outlined emergency response actions, preferred vendor lists and purchasing policy.
- Effort is underway to address the "fob" issue, with many SH people needing fobs and many fobs not working properly.
- The Board discussed the needs and issues for developing online document storage for all SH minutes, policies, etc.
- The Board decided on action steps to be taken to deal with misuse of SpringHouse parking spaces.
