I think maybe just the fact that I need to come up with something new to say EVERY time can be stressful. But, for me, it's more than that. You see, very early in my ordained life someone said to

me, "The front-page article needs to be good because it's the only permanent record that will be around to show people who the pastor was." To which I replied..."What?!?!" But he was right. 
January 29-Annual Meeting Sunday Schedule


ANNUAL MEETING

Everyone is welcome to join us for chili tasting and judging! (no qualifications necessary) We appreciate any hands that can help with the set up and the clean up as well. Sign up



Spiritual Practices Inform Being Church

During Advent we began each Sunday worship by experiencing a different spiritual practice together. It was a good way to see some of the different ways we can shape our own spiritual lives and our lives together. It is important for us to know that the most important part of our Advent adventure was the "why". Why were we "practicing" these practices?

Each week before we dove into our practice of the week we heard these words: "Our spiritual practices are DIRECTLY CORRELATED to the way we neighbor."

What does this mean? It means that how well we attend to our own spiritual lives (both individually and as a community)...how intentional we are about making space for deepening our relationship with God...has a *direct impact* on the way we encounter our neighbors and how we are able to "be church" in the world.

The more centered we are, the more in tune we are with God's presence in our daily living and the more we allow ourselves to enter authentic relationship with God, the more able we will be to enter into authentic and mutual relationship with our neighbor.

Boiling it down, it really is as simple as saying...in order to really be church to our neighbors, we MUST be consistently doing the spiritual practices that connect us to God.

So what spiritual practices are you doing today?

Coloring Mandalas as Prayer



Contemplative coloring is a simple, enjoyable, and tangible way to let go of your distractions and focus on God. Embrace the opportunity to nurture a deeper relationship with God through the colorful, contemplative practice of praying with mandalas.

- 1. Everyone is an artist. Trust that you are a work of art created by God. Whatever you create will be a work of art as well.
- 2.Set aside time. Designate time in your day to be with God on purpose. You may even choose to mark your prayer time as an appointment with God on your calendar.
- 3.**Set aside sacred space**. You may find it easier to spend time with God on purpose if you create a special space that is dedicated to prayer. If the space is comfortable and inviting, you will long to spend time there in prayer.
- 4.Lines are optional. Release yourself from the pressure to color inside the lines. When praying with mandalas, lines are mere suggestions. Color within them, color on them, draw new lines, or draw beyond the lines. Anything goes!
- 5.No color is off-limits. Pick colors that attract you and hold meaning for you match, clash or blend colors. Don't

- overthink color selection so that it becomes a distraction of its own. Whatever colors you choose are precisely the right colors for your prayer
- 6.Leave blank space. There is no need to "finish" coloring a mandala. You can leave blank space that you return to at a later time. The blank spaces may even become integral parts of your prayerful creation.
- 7.Coloring utensils. Colored pencils are a favorite of mine when it comes to coloring. If you prefer brighter colors, gel pens can be a nice option as well.
- 8.Spin the mandala. Remember that you can spin the mandala any direction you wish so that you can color comfortably whether you are left-handed or right-handed.
- 9.Breathe. This may seem self-evident. However, sometimes in moments of great focus, it's easy to hold your breath in concentration. Relax and breathe deeply while you color and pray.
- 10.The sky's the limit! Perhaps one of the most important things to remember is that there is no right way to color. Liberate yourself from any preconceived notion of how coloring is supposed to be done. Embrace your inner child and follow where the spirit leads. Your focus is the journey, not the destination.

Faith Practices for Kids-Body Prayer



A body prayer is simply a prayer involving movement or physical action. It's easy for kids to understand this-it's prayer with actions. Sometimes we close our eyes,

fold our hands, or bow our heads. Some people kneel, some people open their hands, some people even dance. Take time to talk to kids about the idea that God made our bodies and we can use our bodies when we pray. Below is one body prayer that works well for EVERYONE–go ahead and try it at home!

BODY PRAYER



Placing both hands on top of the head, pray out oud:

God be in my head and in my understanding.

Placing both hands over the eyes, pray out loud: God be in my eyes and in my seeing.



Placing both hands over the ears, pray out loud: God be in my ears and in my hearing.

Placing both hands over the mouth, pray out loud: God be in my mouth and in my speaking.



Placing both hands over the heart, pray out loud: God be in my heart and in my feeling.

Placing both hands on top of the thighs, pray out loud:

God be in my legs and in my moving.



Placing open hands one on top of the other in front of the body, pray out loud:

God be in my hands and in my touching.

Placing both arms at the side of the body, hands open and turning outward, offering our life to God, pray out loud:

God be in my life and in my journeying. Amen.
