God Has Plans for Us!

As I look out my window and see the leaves beginning to change–just kidding, my office window looks up from the lower level to the patio and I can't see any leaves at all. While leaves changing in the fall are certainly one of my favorite things, today I want to talk about bumper stickers, kids time, presence, and neighboring. For those following along, we just finished our short 4 weeks series on Bumper Sticker Theology, talking about some of the

cliché sayings we find on the cars in front of us in traffic. What a fun series! Well, on the final week, during kids time, I asked Axel, Ingrid, and Kjell if they might be able to help me come up with a sticker for our church...something short and easy to remember that tells people what our church is really all about. To be honest, I thought it was kind of a challenging assignment. But before I even finished posing the question, Axel said, "We love God...God loves us more." Now, I was tempted to say, "Amen, we can all go home now." But I wanted to make sure we didn't short Ingrid on any of her thoughts. (I could tell Kjell would need a little more time...I mean, he was sitting up there on his own for the first time and that was probably enough for one Sunday.) Well, without skipping a beat, Ingrid said, "Love ALL people, no matter who they are." Well ok then...class dismissed, church over, drop the mic, it is finished, time for donuts.

In fact, if you have ever wondered if our faith community still has a purpose, if you've had moments of doubt about our future, or have just asked yourself if we are doing anything that makes a difference...check out our newest Salem stickers.

Axel and Ingrid came up with these answers because, in addition to some great parenting, they are growing up in a loving community of faith that speaks its truth, is not afraid to voice welcome, preaches love in tangible ways, and has given them the confidence to know that God loves them and so do we.

This would be enough. If this was the only difference we have made recently, it would be enough. But it's not. There are countless stories of ways our community has made these truths known to each other and our neighbors that have made a difference.

Remember that college freshman who found himself on Sunday mornings, alone in his dorm, watching worship on YouTube? The couple who had not been able participate who said being with us on YouTube felt like "coming home"? The families that have reached out in gratitude after experiencing our care after loosing a loved one? Or the family who couldn't even get their "home" church to answer the phone and yet found us willing to welcome them without question? How about all the people who have walked through our door who have been told by the world that they were not worthy, who found we meant it when we said "all means ALL"?

I could go on and on...and so could you...but you get the idea...church may look different, this congregation may be small, but we are mighty, we are blessed, and God has plans for us. Plans that center around simple things like presence (just being there—wherever there is) and authentic welcome (and I challenge anyone to show me a community that does it better.) When we are consistent in doing these things and when we lead from a place of faith and from our assets instead of falling into the mentality of fear and scarcity...well, not only are we faithful to our call as disciples (as church), but we end up with little humans like Axel, Ingrid, and Kjell, who have a profound understanding of God's love that, frankly, can teach us all.





"We are excited to add Johan to our team," stated Bishop Ann Svennungsen. "He brings real-world experience that will give us a fresh look at our ministry, even as we adjust the focus of his position to more deeply consider 'climate justice."

"It's really inspiring to see that members of my own faith tradition are singing out a prophetic call for hope, justice, and an equitable environmental future," responded Johan when asked about why he was interested in this position. "These are my values too, and so – in the words of the hymn – 'how can I keep from singing?"

ZOOM House News

Salem recently received this update from ZOOM House

Over the past few years, ZOOM House has struggled to maintain financial stability. Through our wonderful donors, long term relationships with local parishes, foundations and grant funding, they were able to continue their mission. Unfortunately, they have realized that they will not be able to continue as ZOOM House nonprofit.

ZOOM Board initiated a strategic action plan last year to achieve the organizational and financial stability to continue to provide safe, affordable housing and services. The board believed that the most effective option was to be acquired by another organization with deeper financial and operational resources. Without a change, ZOOM House would run out of funds in early 2024.

They engaged a consultant and consulted with other organizations to find a solution and avoid negatively impacting our residents and secure inventory of affordable housing in Minneapolis.

ZOOM House is now in the final due diligence phase with a partner with deeper resources and extensive experience with both affordable housing and supportive services. If all goes well, the building will transition to the new owner by the end of the year. Then ZOOM House will conclude the dissolution process, and wrap-up its 25+ year run serving families and individuals experiencing housing instability.

There are risks and potential hurdles to the plan, including city and state approval timelines. If approvals are not acquired before ZOOM's financial resources are exhausted, residents will be forced to move with little time to plan. Your contributions will help ensure residents are well cared for while ZOOM House, its partner, and lenders have the time to complete their work.



SpringHouse Board News

The SpringHouse Board met Sunday, August 20, following the SH Joint Worship at Minnehaha Falls Wabun Park.

Highlights of meeting:

Updates from the SH congregations:

- Lyndale UCC has formed a Search Committee and hopes to have the search concluded by the end of the year
- The ashes of three Lyndale members will be interred in the SH Memorial Garden sometime this fall. All congregations will be invited to the ceremony.
- The SH library is being "refreshed" watch for changes.

Andy Rennert's finance report stated that we are ahead in the annual budget at this point. Funds set aside for capital improvements are being invested in interest-bearing CDs.

Reporting for the <u>Building Committee</u>, Mike Cackoski noted that a recent leak was caused by an air conditioner duct, and a window on the east side of the building was broken. Both have been repaired.

Brief discussion about SH fundraising, and mechanisms for giving memorial gifts to SpringHouse. No action taken.

Motions approved:

- SH kitchen committee is authorized to either sell or donate the blue & white dinner service.
- A new twice-a-year Sanctuary Switch schedule was approved, which will start January 2024, and run in a three -year cycle.
