One of the great joys I have as a pastor, is sharing the pulpit with others willing to preach the gospel. A few weeks ago I was inspired by a visit to share another space ...the newsletter front page. And so I step aside this time around and offer you the front page from long time Salem member and ordained Lutheran pastor of over 60 years, Roger Livdahl. The story he shares is one he wrote down as an introduction to his own journal about his travels working for the gospel. Thanks Roger!

IN CHICAGO: "This Man Is Jesus!"



In the eight years I worked in Chicago for the ELCA World Hunger and Disaster Appeals I spent between three and six hours a day commuting between the churchwide center and our home in Valparaiso, IN. One night I had a late start before I entered the Kennedy Expressway which was like a

very slow moving parking lot. After about 45 minutes I became very hungry. Seeing a Wendy's drive-In along the way I pulled off the Kennedy hoping that the traffic would diminish while I ate.

While circling in the slow line to the drive-in window I had watched a man standing by the entrance. I handed a \$10 bill to the window person to pay for a hamburger and small drink which came to \$2.84. She handed me \$7.16 in change. The man quietly moved up to my window and asked, "Sir could you spare a little of your change. I haven't had anything to eat in two days.

My first inclination was to think, "What if he is just an alcoholic or a drug addict? Do I really want to feed his bad habit?" As I looked at him I saw how thin and haggard he looked, and thought, Maybe, he's suffering from AIDS?"

I said, "Sure, take this,• as I handed him \$2.16. He looked happy and appreciative. Then I thought, "What if he really hasn't eaten for two days? If so, \$2.16 won't buy him much, even at Wendy's." I called the man back to my window and pulling the remaining \$5.00 change out of my pocket I said, "Sir, would you mind taking this?"

Then he did a very surprising thing He started to dance around and shouted to the woman at the serving window and all the cars lined up behind me, "This man is Jesus! He gave me much more than I expected!" He said it several times to the other people walking into the restaurant. I was embarrassed and wondered, "When is my hamburger going to get here?"

I thought, "This man is really mistaken. I gave him just \$7.16 and he calls me, Jesus? Talk about cheap grace!" I have believed that If I give to a hungry person I may be giving to Jesus. It was so much more difficult to believe others could see me as Jesus, when I was doing something that required so little sacrifice from me.

I guess, as Christians we are called to reflect Christ to others at unexpected times, unbelievable as that may seem.

"Therefore be imitators of God as beloved children, And live in love, as Christ loved us, And gave himself up for us, A fragrant offering and sacrifice to God." Ephesians 5:1-2

Roger was ordained over 60 years ago. But did you know that after many years in the parish he worked for Church World Services for 13 years traveling the globe addressing hunger, disaster, and crisis. In 1990 Roger became the Director of ELCA World Hunger and Disaster Appeals and served at ELCA churchwide for 8 years. 

A Journey Through the Labyrinth

Color the labyrinth on the next page using crayons, colored pencils etc. Use as many colors as possible; this will make it easier for your eyes to follow your "walking" finger. Choose a walking finger and breathe smoothly. As you trace the path (from the outside opening at the bottom to the center, move at whatever pace feels right for you. As you do so, you may opt to:

- Quiet your mind
- Pray for yourself or someone else
- Keep a question in mind and feel the question using your emotions

At the center, pause and take several slow deep breathers (keeping your finger inside the center or place your hands comfortably on your lap). Here, many believe you are the closest to the center of your spirit and greater insight is available. When ready to leave the center, or feel satisfied (like after eating a good meal) retrace the path back out to the entrance (which now becomes the exit point). Upon leaving



the labyrinth, be grateful and thankful for the opportunity to bring divine strength and insight back with you into your daily life.

Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church



At the 2022 ELCA Churchwide gathering the Church Council was directed:

"to establish a Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church comprised of leaders of diverse representation from all three expressions that, working in consultation with the Conference of Bishops and the Church

Council, shall reconsider the statements of purpose for each of the expressions of this church, the principles of its organizational structure, and all matters pertaining thereunto, being particularly attentive to our shared commitment to dismantle racism, and will present its findings and recommendations to the 2025 Churchwide Assembly in preparation for a possible reconstituting convention to be called under the rules for a special meeting of the Churchwide Assembly." [CA22.01.06]

This is a churchwide initiative put forth to evaluate and make recommendations about the structure and function of the

ELCA. It is meant to take a deep dive into the 3 expressions of the ELCA: Churchwide, Synods, & Congregations. The Commission will be giving a report and making recommendations for change at the 2025 Churchwide Assembly.

New Books in SpringHouse Library! Learning to See Strangers Through Jesus' Eyes. By Naomi Nelson (Salem Member)

I have been asked to share a few comments on a couple of the new books added to the Springhouse Library that are displayed on the Library Cart off the sun room.

Stranger God: Meeting Jesus in Disguise by Richard Beck


This is a book about the "strangeness of a God" who comes to us in strangers. (Matthew 25) Jesus comes to us in disguise in foreigners and refugees, in the homeless and outcasts, in the prisoner and the hungry. Beck draws on his own experiences in response to his Stranger God's call to love and compassion for the other, the stranger.

I read this book a couple of years ago and will be reading it again and again.

The message reached down into the very depths of my soul (and in my gut). It forever changed me. I particularly saw the homeless through new eyes. I live in Uptown and am in walking distance to most places I

frequent . I would encounter persons on Lyndale, Lake Street and Hennepin in particular, who would ask for money and some showed evidence they had been sleeping there. Often I felt uncertain how I should respond. With some I could but with others I was more hesitant (let's just say it, whatever I was feeling had its roots in "fear"). I have truly believed that Jesus called me to love my neighbor and I have always felt a deep sadness whenever I have neglected to act like one. Thank goodness for God's grace. This writer's message has touched my heart and liberated me. I can now make eye contact, smile, ask their name, and see them for whom they are. God's Beloved. (And their names are added to my prayer list.) That segues into the next book

Life of the Beloved by Henri J. M. Nouwen




Nouwen wrote "Life of the Beloved" for the secular world at the request of a secular Jewish friend. However, it has also ended up making a tremendously deep impression on searching Christians.


Henri says, "Self-rejection is the greatest enemy of the spiritual life because it contradicts the sacred voice that calls us the "Beloved." Being the Beloved expresses the core truth of our existence." And - the existence of all those strangers out there who are also His Beloved that He wants us to see.

In any Nouwen book I have read, God's quiet voice reaches me through his words and experiences and I am changed. This one filled me with joy and peace and the embracing of His "fierce love". (Author Brennan Manning's expression from "Ragamuffin's Gospel".)
