Big Shoes, Practices, Neighboring...It's Not Nothing



Sometimes the front page of the church newsletter feels like a lot of pressure. Sometimes I have to cut my writing in half to fit it all on the page. Sometimes this space feels profound and other times it feels...well, not profound at all. But no matter how difficult it may seem sometimes...something usually makes it to the page. Today I've got nothing. So, in the interest of keeping it real...maybe I'll just sit over here and wait for the Holy Spirit to move, to breath, to do anything that will give me something instead of the nothing I've got.

Three days later...

I'm not always sure of what the Spirit is saying, but today it has something to do with the big shoes we have to fill. I think we always knew it would be the case, but the 160+ people at Roger's celebration of life service confirmed it...big shoes. Not only do we have big shoes to fill...but the time we are living in is calling us to be the kind of faith-filled and welcoming force Roger was every day.

Were you with us to see how many people came to Christmas Eve worship? We had so many people, we had to borrow chairs from other rooms just to have a seat for everyone. What I have found out over the last couple of weeks is that Salem was not unique this year on Christmas...it seems there was a bumper crop of people walking through church doors everywhere.

It is not a secret that the world is offering up lots of reasons for people to seek out the baby in a manger...and the communities of believers that gather around him. With the division in our country, uncertainty and fear around the inauguration of a new president, wildfires raging, and countless other things that cause anxiety and pain...I believe people need the church in real, palpable ways right now.

Over the last few weeks, I have not been able to help but think about Roger and his quiet, humble, ways of showing up for so many for so long. His gentle but real welcome to church is the reason many of you found yourselves part of our community. His quiet witness through his passion for ELCA World Hunger and Global Health influenced countless choices this congregation has made about its money and time. Big shoes...

A wise person recently brought to my attention that we have not talked about Faith Practices & Neighboring Practices lately. I mean, we have because it is really part of all we do...but she's right, we haven't talked about it, and it got me thinking.

While Roger's shoes may be very hard to fill, in what ways have we already been following in his footsteps? And Roger is just one of the amazing examples of faith we have had in this church family who taught us through their living what it means to practice our faith and to neighbor well. What things are we already doing that show the impact they've had on us? I wonder how their lives of faith practices and neighboring can shape our ministry as we move into this new year.

We will gather in two weeks for our annual congregational meeting. It's always a chance for us to look back and see what we did over the last year and then to envision and make some decisions about what our next year of ministry together will look like. This is an important year for us to gather...because the world is telling us people need church in ways they haven't in a long time AND it's our faith practices & neighboring practices that will help us, maybe not to "fill" the shoes of Roger and our other saints at Salem, but to follow in their steps so that we are living into the welcoming community we are and the neighboring we can do.

Well, I'm not sure if it's profound or not. It's been a busy few months and my brain is a wee bit muddled as we begin 2025. But the Spirit did move...as she always does...and it's not nothing. Here's to a new year of ministry together!


